Covid Update

As the end of summer nears, the Government has set out plans for tackling the COVID-19 virus during the autumn and winter periods. At this stage, the Methodist Church does not see a need to change its overall guidance as outlined on the 22 July 2021. This saw a move towards making more informed decisions locally. Full details of the Government's statement can be in the Autumn and Winter Plan.



We are continuing to monitor Government guidance on a monthly basis, and will communicate any changes as needed through the usual communication channels.

HSE Update on Covid

HSE is supporting businesses to reduce the risk of coronavirus as more people return to the workplace. Alongside cleaning, hygiene and



handwashing, good ventilation is one of the best ways to reduce the spread of coronavirus in the workplace.

As coronavirus spreads through the air, the virus can build up in poorly ventilated areas, increasing the risk of infection. It is a legal requirement for employers to ensure an adequate supply of fresh air (ventilation) in enclosed areas of the workplace. Maximising the fresh air in a space can be done by:

- <u>Natural ventilation</u> which relies on passive air flow through windows, doors and air vents that can be fully or partially opened
- Mechanical ventilation using fans and ducts to bring in fresh air from outside, or
- A combination of natural and mechanical ventilation

Our <u>updated guidance</u> looks at how to identify poorly ventilated areas and steps you can take to improve ventilation. It includes a <u>video</u> to help you.

New £1 Million Fund Launched to Help Faith Groups Support Communities (England)

Faith groups in England can apply to a new £1 million pilot fund to support innovative projects combating loneliness and isolation, providing debt advice and helping those who were unemployed during the pandemic get back to work.



The funding is being made available through the Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government's new Faith New Deal pilot fund.

Funded pilots will be innovative projects to strengthen engagement between local and national government and faith groups - testing what can be achieved when they work together. The programme will fund projects to tackle social issues, including those arising from the impact of COVID-19, to support the recovery efforts of communities. Applicants must demonstrate how they will support one or more of the following COVID-19 recovery objectives:

- mental wellbeing and loneliness
- debt advice
- employability
- food poverty
- increasing community engagement through volunteering

Organisations can bid in their own right or as part of a consortium of organisations and the maximum grant available is £200,000. Bids up to £125,000 will need to demonstrate in-kind match (non-cash) commitment from their own or wider sources (venues, volunteers or staff hours). Larger bids for grants over £125,000, will require a match donation from a philanthropic funder

The closing date for applications is the 7th October 2021.



Metal Theft Guidance from Historic England

<u>Historic England</u> have updated their metal theft guidance. The three guidance notes are:

- Theft of Metal from Church Roofs: Replacement Materials
- Theft of Metal from Church Roofs: Prevention and Response
- Church Roof Replacement Using Terne-coated
 Stainless Steel



The revised note does not change HE's policy. It seeks to articulate our understanding of the emotional, social and financial cost that metal theft imposes on congregations and the reasons why we don't consider like-for-like replacement of lost lead or copper to be reasonable in most cases. It supports the use of long-lasting appropriate alternatives such as terne-coated stainless steel, and explains why we don't support the use of synthetic plastic-based materials as roof coverings.

The note aims to give clear information to congregations, Diocesan Advisory Committees and Chancellors, architects, surveyors and local authorities. It focusses on church buildings, as these are the primary targets for thieves, but the information is also applicable to other listed buildings and places of worship. The note sets out the difference between emergency coverings, temporary coverings and permanent replacement materials.

The Story of the First Methodist Church in England to Host a Shop

A friendly store with over 1000 products on sale, the Buckland Brewer community shop operates from the vestry of the Methodist church - and has done since 10th December 2012. The shop premise is leased from the Methodist church at a market rent. Primarily staffed by volunteers it offers a range of goods including a wide



variety of local produce, and services for parts of six days a week and prepaid for newspapers can be picked up on Sunday mornings.

It is the first Methodist church in England to host a village shop. The idea came about when the previous village shop closed in 2009. A village committee identified the church, in the centre of the village, as a potential site and chapel members were keen. Click here to read the full story.
