"RECOGNISING THE RISEN CHRIST"

Call to Worship:

Leader 1: The Lord is risen.

Leader 2: He is risen indeed! Hallelujah!

Leader 1: The Lord is here.

Leader 2: His Spirit is with us. Hallelujah!

Leader 1: Who is it that you seek?

Leader 2: We seek the Lord. **Leader 1:** The Lord is here.

Leader 2: Let us worship the Lord in spirit and truth.

Introduction to the service: Leader 1

Have you ever wondered what it must have been like for those first disciples, meeting the Risen Christ for the first time after seeing him crucified and dead upon the Cross? They found it difficult to believe their eyes! In our service today we are going to think about how we recognise the Risen Jesus, in three ways – in our daily lives, in life-changing encounters and in the needs of others. We stand to sing our first hymn -

Prayer of Adoration: Leader 2

During our prayer of Adoration, there will be a sung response to the words 'And so we sing' - "He is Lord", verse 1 of StF 348; H&P 256; or MP 220

Let us pray: God of surprises, we thank you that your love for us is new every morning:

The love that gives life to the world;

The love that raised Jesus from the dead;

The love that has given us new life in his name.

And so we sing:

He is Lord, He is Lord,

He is risen from the dead

And He is Lord.

Every knee shall bow,

Every tongue confess

That Jesus Christ is Lord.

In our prayers,

In the words and music of our worship,

Gospel Reading 1: Reader 1 - John 21:1-14

Reader 2: 'Life goes on' so they say And so we returned to home and work, Confused, excited, nervously hopeful

And not knowing what to do next, But aware we needed to work and eat.

Fill us with your Holy Spirit, that we may hold ourselves in readiness For the coming into our lives of Jesus Christ, At the time least expected. In his name we pray, **Amen.**

New Testament Reading: Reader 3 - Acts 9:1-11, 17-20

Reflection: Reader 4

Saul was so sure he'd got it right. He was so sure he knew what God wanted him to do. He was so sure he could see what life was all about.

Then he was blinded by the brilliance that is the Lord He no longer knew where he was going, what he should do. He could no longer manage on his own.

There was no certainty, only questions.

But there was hope and there was love As anger dissolved and faith grew strong.

In his blindness he had met Jesus And now he could truly see and know The way ahead.

Prayer of commitment: Leader 2: Let us pray:

Commissioning God, from earliest times you have called women and men to serve your loving purposes in many different ways. You ask us to be alert to your call to us, ready to drop everything to go and follow you.

We pray that we may be obedient to that call; committed followers of Jesus willing to be his body in the world, ready to share his good news

We ask that your Holy Spirit may give us all that we need to follow our calling. may we be loving and wise, steadfast and rich in faith.

We look forward, loving God, to our life ahead with you. Help us to work and pray together so that the world can see the love, hope and joy we know living by faith in you. In Jesus our Leader's Name, **Amen**

Life Story: Reader 5

John Newton who wrote the popular hymn "Amazing Grace" was born in the eighteenth century. He lost his Christian mother at an early age and grew up a "bad boy". He says that through much of his youth and life at sea, "I loved sin and was unwilling to forsake it." He renounced the Christian faith. In West Africa he went into partnership with a slave trader. Life was good, he recalled. "We lived as we pleased and business flourished." One day on board ship, Newton was reading—casually, "to pass away the time"—an edition of Thomas à Kempis' classic, *On the Imitation of Christ*. He wondered, "What if these things were true?" Dismayed, he "shut the book quickly." Newton called himself a terrible "blasphemer" who had rejected God completely. But then, God showed up.

That night, a violent storm flooded the ship with water. Fearing for his life, Newton surprised himself by saying, "The Lord have mercy on us!" Spending long hours at the ship's helm, he reflected on his life and rejection of God. At first, he thought his shortcomings too great to be forgiven. Then, he says, "I . . . began to think of . . . Jesus whom I had so often derided . . . of His life and of His death . . . for sins not His own, but for those who in their distress should put their trust in Him." In coming days, the New Testament story of the Prodigal Son particularly impressed him. He became convinced of the truth of Jesus' message and his own need for it. "I was no longer an atheist," he writes. "I was sincerely touched with a sense of undeserved mercy in being

brought safe through so many dangers. . . . I was a new man." After his dramatic experience at sea, Newton changed his life. He attended church, read spiritual books, prayed, and spoke outwardly of his commitment. But he still took part in the slave trade. Two days before he was to embark on his fourth slave-trading voyage as ship's captain, a mysterious illness temporarily paralyzed Newton. His doctors advised him not to sail. Now out of the slave trade, Newton became a prominent public official in Liverpool. He attended Christian meetings and grew in his faith. Newton's biblical worldview had matured to the point that he became active in the abolition of the slavery movement. It was after spending a day with Newton that William Wilberforce recorded in his diary his decision to focus on abolishing slavery. In early 1807 Britain outlawed the slave trade. On December 21 of that year, grace finally led John Newton home to his Maker.

Prayers of Intercession: Leader 2

Leader 2: 'When I was a stranger, you took me into your home; when naked, you clothed me.'

Leader 1: God with us, we pray for those without homes or protection from the elements: For refugees, the destitute, those thrown out of home and those living on the street, for

Your kingdom come: Your will be done.

Leader 2: 'When I was ill, you came to my help'

Leader 1: God with us, we pray for those who are ill:

For those with chronic or life-threatening physical conditions

And those who are sick in mind or spirit, for

Your kingdom come: Your will be done.

Leader 2: 'When I was in prison you visited me.'

Leader 1: God with us, we pray for those who are imprisoned:

For criminals and for prisoners of conscience

And for those who feel imprisoned by fear or guilt, for

Your kingdom come: Your will be done.

For Jesus's sake we love and serve. For Jesus's sake we pray. Amen.
